Clinic Focuses on Building a Partnership between Riders and Their Horses

Last month a WDCTA Eastern Chapter member hosted a three-day clinic with Tik Maynard. Tik is the 2024 and 2025 World Champion of Colt Starting (Road to the Horse). He earned those titles after 30+ years of living with, riding and competing horses across disciplines. Prior to entering Road to the Horse, Tik invested three years as a working student, learning about competition and horsemanship from world class riders and trainers. Those experiences became the foundation for his building blocks of great horsemanship: Observation, Communication, Motivation and Play.

Throughout the clinic, Tik utilized those building blocks to help riders, horse owners and horses open up to stronger partnerships. He emphasized the importance of curiosity in building a confident horse. Confident horses are less likely to explode and more likely to be successful in competition. More importantly, confident horses are perceived to have a higher quality, less stressful life.

I observed Tik utilize those building blocks to train my horse, Haddy, to confidently load into our trailer. With my horse, he spent a lot of time on the observation phase. Eventually, he moved into communication and started building motivation.

Trailering is something we all do, but we rarely spend the time necessary to prepare our horses for a low stress ride. We spend months developing ourselves for show season or a big move. We'll practice a dressage test to the point that even the horse has it memorized. We'll create 100 different jump patterns to make sure we've experienced every angle and stride count imaginable. We'll even go out and buy the latest clothes, gadgets and equipment. But, we often fail to prepare our horses for that scary ride to who knows where. With guidance from Tik, I learned to make trailer loading a regular part of our preparation. I'm teaching Haddy that not every load results in arriving in an unfamiliar venue. I'm helping her feel good about entering the trailer—sometimes just to enjoy a couple German Muffins. I'm using Tik's building blocks to minimize the stress of going offsite.

From an observation perspective, Tik noted my horse holds a lot of tension. In new environments, she'll breathe heavily through her nostrils, won't want to stand still, and sometimes will be inclined to step more quickly than her typical pace. He informed me that this behavior tells us that she's in a state of thoughtfulness. She's at the edge of her comfort zone—not a great place to begin teaching. She's not at the point of exploding, but pushing her while in such a tense state could lead to explosive behavior. Ideally, we'd like her to settle down into a 3 or 4 out of 10 on the relaxation scale.

To help her acclimate to the environment and regain some of her confidence, we started working her with something she knows: backing up, yielding—anything to help her gain confidence and release some tension. We practiced with figure eight patterns around buckets on the ground. When she successfully completed the pattern, she would be directed toward another bucket with a treat for her to consume. These simple exercises, followed by treat breaks, set her up to be curious and confident. It made the idea of going toward the big, scary trailer less intimidating for her. This more relaxed

state also allowed her to be more open to learning and retaining the new knowledge.

We were constantly looking for signs of tension release: blinking, licking, chewing. Even the ability to stand still is a sign of relaxation. We encouraged and rewarded any release

my mare offered. Whenever signs or relaxation are given, take breaks to allow for processing.

We also talked about the use of the person's body language to engage the horse in relaxation. Your stance is a queue to your horse. Utilizing a relaxed stance is a sign of praise and recognition that your horse is behaving in the desired manner. This is the most basic level of communication we provide the horse, but can be the most effective.

To ensure that Haddy stayed in a relaxed state, we broke the learning process down into small, manageable steps. Tik started by just walking her near the trailer. It was her trailer, and she is familiar with it, so that did not generate any new tension. After that, he returned to basic exercises like walking, backing, yielding and figure eights, followed by another snack break.

Next, he encouraged Haddy to put one foot on the ramp. When she did, he paused for her to process where she was and maintain her relaxed state. While it didn't look very impressive, she was already learning that being on the ramp doesn't have to be stressful. It can simply be a place we go, eat a carrot and back away from.

Once Haddy was easily placing a single hoof on the ramp, he asked for a second step. He continued with small steps, allowing her the time needed to gain confidence. Tik then allowed her to explore the trailer, encouraging her to look around, smell her surroundings and get comfortable with the inside of the trailer.

When going through these steps, his body language clearly articulated whether Haddy should be moving forward, holding steady or backing up. At times, he utilized a training stick to supplement body language to convey clear directions. Tik stressed never pushing or dragging the horse. When you're not getting the relaxation and processing that you're looking for, don't force it. Give yourself and your horse time. It's important not to push the horse beyond its comfort zone. That's when they are most likely to blow up, create negative associations or take on adverse behaviors.



As Tik moved Haddy through the steps of trailer loading, he provided motivation. There were different levels and forms of motivation. A guick, easy motivation can be a moment to stand still and process after completing a new step in loading. Another form of motivation is the offering of treats. My mare is particularly food motivated, so Haddy was willing to take an extra step when a carrot or piece of candy cane suddenly emerged. I also like to use voice praise as motivation. Some horses respond well to a pat on the shoulder or a scratch above their ears. Use the tools you think will motivate or reward your horse. As long as you're making the time for processing and giving positive reinforcement, the learning should stick. This allows the horse to come to the problem with less anxiety the next time he/she encounters it, which eventually can result in a relaxed horse that meets new problems with confidence to solve them without needing long, step-bystep training.

As the clinic came to an end, we did not engage the final building block: play. At this point in her training, and possibly not in the future, the trailer was not an appropriate place for play. Instead, when we got home, I offered my mare extra time to graze in the field. I even hosed her off knowing full well that she would immediately roll in the dirt. For her, having that wild roll and scratching the itches is a playful reward she deserved after working so hard to learn a new skill. Good job, Haddy!



Learning Opportunities Abound—And Many are FREE!

I'm back after nearly two weeks on the road (and my husband is quite glad to not be doing the barn by himself). I was attending my first step in the "R" judge program in Saugerties, NY. While that program is certainly not free, it requires we candidates to have scribes as we practice judging Third and Fourth Levels (with some Prix St. George tests thrown in). Being a scribe for this program—or any of the judge licensing programs) provides a great opportunity to learn.

Once back from New York (after a side trip to Cape Cod to see a friend), I immediately drove the next day to Silverwood to observe with Bill McMullin, an "S" judge, for my "R" program and then the next day, returned the "favor" to the show manager by scribing for the show. I put favor in quotes because I actually think the show management is doing ME a favor by letting me scribe. I have scribed hundreds of hours in the last six years and learn something from every judge I scribe for—which helps me not only judgge better but also helps when I'm competing. I encourage you to volunteer to scribe; you give back to the sport, and you learn a ton!

Other learning opportunities include the two upcoming USDF educational events. (See top of page 6 for details.) I know I'm going to join in on the freestyle event for sure. I'd do the book club event with Anne Gribbons too, as she is an interesting and experienced dressage icon, if it wasn't for the fact that I'm in another book club that I'm hosting in July, so I better focus on the book I chose...and the food I need to provide (which if you know me, you understand the cooking is the biggest challenge for me!).

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Ride-n-Review Clinic with Judy Downer

Elevating Dressage Performance

A dynamic two-day Ride-n-Review Clinic, hosted by WDCTDA's Eastern Chapter at Bannerview Farm, featured clinician, Judy Downer, a distinguished dressage judge and coach from Ocala, Florida.

The clinic featured 30-minute sessions where riders performed a traditional or Western dressage test or an eventing test. After the rider's final salute, Judy provided tailored feedback and recommended exercises to enhance performance and maximize competition scores.

About Judy Downer

Judy brings a wealth of expertise to the arena:

- Credentials: Holds a USEF
 S dressage judge license and an R Western dressage judge license.
- Achievements: Earned all three USDF Rider Medals, won three regional championships and received the Diamond Achievement Award.
- Coaching: Guided students to USDF rider medals and national-level competitions.
- Academic Insight: Holds a Ph.D. in Animal Nutrition, enhancing her approach to equine performance.


Clinic Highlights

The clinic showcased nine horse breeds of varying ages and skill levels, performing tests from Introductory to Prix St. Georges, including Western dressage and eventing tests. Judy's feedback emphasized the dressage training scale, focusing on throughness, hind leg activity and rider biomechanics for balanced, effective riding.

Key Takeaways by Level

Introductory Level

- Rider Technique: Use your seat and close your fingers to bring the horse back, avoiding rein-pulling. For downward transitions (e.g., canter to trot), ride "up to the trot" to maintain balance.
- True Bend: Horses bend in three areas: (1) Poll/Neck
 most flexible; riders should see the horse's inside

eye and nostril without overbending. Use legs, not just reins, to guide neck bend. (2) Thoracic Spine/Ribcage—contracts on the inside, opens on the outside for apparent bend; inside leg at the girth and close outside rein at the withers with elbow at ribs. (3) Lumbar-Sacral Area—second most bendable area; use the outside leg behind girth to bend hindquarters.

 Exercise: To correct slipping to the left in the saddle, remove the left stirrup while circling right, performing walk-trot-walk transitions.

Training Level

- Focus and Connection: Use a soft inside rein, squeezing "one drop out of a lemon" until the horse softens its ears, then hold. Inside rein builds connection; outside rein steers and maintains balance via half-halts. At higher levels, connect on outside rein with a subtle, snake-like slide across the bit.
- Poll Position: If the poll drops too low, squeeze your legs to fill the space to the bit and push hands forward. Avoid raising the horse's head with hands.

First Level

- Balance Correction: For a horse shifting to the forehand, sit the trot and half-halt. Sitting the trot during a First Level test can help achieve this.
- Stretch Trot: Ensure contact and connection before stretching down. The horse must reach for the bit after softening. Push hands forward, touch one rein, then push hands forward again—don't spread or lower hands.
- Canter Positioning: Keep the nose centered in the chest. Avoid overusing the inside rein, which lowers the poll; use the outside rein and soften inside rein.
- Transitions: Ensure clear distinctions between gaits.
 The horse sustains each gait through spinal cord coordination. When shifting gaits, apply a half-halt to engage the horse's brain, promoting a smooth and controlled transition.

Second Level

- Improving Bend and Giving in the Poll: Use half-circles to the centerline, suppling and changing bend to another half-circle. Use the inside leg so that the ribcage bends around the leg to connect to the outside rein.
- Travers for Engagement: Travers strengthens hind legs more effectively than shoulder-in. Ensure poll and neck suppleness first to enable hind leg engagement.
- Connection: The rider's elbows to their hands belong to the horse's mouth; the upper arms belong to the rider; elbows should be at ribcage. Use the inside

- rein to improve connection and the outside rein for half-halts to adjust balance.
- Test Precision: Fix issues within a movement before proceeding, as each movement has defined start and end points.
- Showing Second Level: Judy recommends mastering flying changes before showing at Second Level to distinguish counter-canter from flying changes.

Higher Levels

- Competition Strategy: Compete one level below your training level to manage show stress.
- Balance Exercise in the Canter: On the long side, ride a 15m circle, then a 12m, then a 10m circle, pushing forward in the canter on the circle and allowing the horse to self-balance between circles.
- Straightness: Address natural crookedness (hips wider than shoulders) with slight shoulder-fore positioning. Straightness precedes collection in the training scale.
- Bracing: If the horse braces, give the reins away, then take back, holding with triceps and shoulder blades, not forearms, with elbows at the ribs.

Why It Matters

Judy's clinic offered practical, level-specific advice that resonated with riders across all skill levels. Her focus on biomechanics, training scale principles and competition readiness provided actionable insights to elevate performance. Whether refining transitions or mastering advanced movements, Judy's expertise empowers riders to achieve harmony and precision in the arena.

The Virtual Horse Show will be conducted by videoing your dressage test and uploading on to YouTube. The judge will complete the score sheets of the test, which will be returned to the riders. Virtual show prizes will be ribbons.

Please note the virtual horse show tests will **not** be included in the WDCTA Awards program.

RULES:

- 1. The video may be taken any time between now and July 28th. The video test must be submitted by July 28th.
- 2. All of the rules of riding a USEF test apply (except as noted below).
- 3. Riders may choose to submit a traditional dressage test, a Western dressage test or an eventing dressage test. Ribbons will be provided for winners from 1st to 4th place for Open, Amateur or Jr/Young Rider divisions.
- 4. The video needs to be made by taking it from where the judge is normally located behind "C." The video needs to be located a distance back from "C," so the full horse and rider are seen. Zooming in and out is recommended.
- 5. The video cannot be edited. If edited, the video will not be reviewed or placed.
- 6. The dressage letters need to be located in the arena, so the judge can see them in the video.
- 7. A helmet is required per USDF/USEF rules. However, the rider's clothes do not need to be per USEF/USDF requirements, but light-colored breeches are preferred. No boots and/or wraps should be on the horse.
- 8. Per USEF/USDF rules only the voice of reading the test is allowed.
- 9. The video must be posted on YouTube, and the link emailed to Melinda DeLuca (jjdmcd@gmail.com). Make sure the YouTube video is titled with the test being ridden and the YouTube posting is made public.
- 10. The video may only be used for this one virtual show with WDCTA.

REGISTRATION:

- 1. Mail the form and a check (made out to WDCTA) to Melinda DeLuca, S14W32743 Forest Hills Dr, Delafield, WI 53018.
- 2. The form and payment must be postmarked or hand delivered to Melinda DeLuca by July 18, 2025.

WISCONSIN DRESSAGE & COMBINED TRAINING ASSOCIATION WAIVER, RELEASE, AND HOLD HARMLESS AGREEMENT

In consideration for my participation in the **JJ TATE CLINIC @ 1402 ROWE RD, SHEBOYGAN, WI 53083, JULY 25-27, 2025** (hereafter, "the Activity"), I (the "Participant") hereby acknowledge and voluntarily agree to the following (hereafter, "Agreement"). "Participation" includes, but is not limited to, riding, handling, instructing, or spectating.

- 1. Acknowledgment of Inherent Risks of Equine Activities. I acknowledge and understand that there are numerous inherent risks of participating in equine activities, including, but not limited to: (a) the propensity of an equine or other animal, irrespective of its training, to behave in ways that may result in injury, harm, or death to persons on or around them (for example, jump, run, kick, buck, bolt, spin, rear, strike, or bite); (b) the unpredictability of an equine's reaction to such things as sounds, sudden movements and unfamiliar objects, persons or other animals; (c) certain hazards such as conditions at or below the surface or ground, whether seen or unseen; (d) collisions with other animals or objects; (e) the potential for another person participating in an equine activity to act in a negligent manner that may contribute to injury to me, or to others, such as failing to maintain control over the equine or not acting within his or her ability; (f) the breakage or failure of tack or other equipment; (g) the potential that an equine or other animal may cause injury or harm to the rider or to other persons or animals in the vicinity; and (h) sickness and disease (including communicable diseases). I understand these risks and further acknowledge that I am not relying on the Wisconsin Dressage and Combined Training Association (hereafter, "WDCTA") to list in this document all possible inherent risks of participating in equine activities or the Activity.
- 2. Acknowledgement that Participation in the Activity is Voluntary and Requires Personal Judgment. I acknowledge and understand that riding instruction by its nature requires that the instructor issue directions in the form of "commands." I understand that while I should consider such commands, I must and will use my own judgment during my participation in the Activity. I understand that while participating in the Activity that: the commands and all activities engaged in as part of the instruction are entirely voluntary; that the instructor is not entitled to nor requests absolute obedience; that I may elect not to comply with any command or suggested act; and that I am expected to at all times be alert and thinking while participating in the Activity. I represent that both my equine and I have the requisite level of physical fitness and mental alertness to enable us to participate in the Activity, and are in good health and free from injury, illness or other defects which may impair our ability to engage in the Activity.
- 3. Waiver and Release of Liability. I understand and voluntarily accept the inherent risks of engaging in equine activities, including risks from my voluntary compliance or noncompliance with instructor commands associated with the Activity. I voluntarily agree to hold harmless, release, waive, and covenant not to sue [JJ TATE], WDCTA, its officers, members, non-members that pay an auditing fee, [CENTER LINE ARENA @ WILD WIND FARM], as well as all other participants in the Activity ("Released Parties") from any and all injuries, sickness and disease, death, liability, or damage to person or property arising from my participation in the Activity, unless caused by Released Parties' reckless, intentional or willful misconduct. Thus, I understand that this waiver and release is effective even if the injury, sickness and disease, death, liability, or damage to person or property is caused or contributed to by the negligent action or inaction of Released Parties.
- 4. Equine Activity Liability Law. I acknowledge that I have read the State of Wisconsin's notice regarding equine activities:

Notice: A person who is engaged for compensation in the rental of equines or equine equipment or tack or in the instruction of a person in the riding or driving of an equine or in being a passenger upon an equine is not liable for the injury or death of a person involved in equine activities resulting from the inherent risks of equine activities, as defined in section 895.481 (1) (e) of the Wisconsin Statutes.

5. Governing Law. This Agreement shall be construed and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of Wisconsin. Any controversy, dispute, or claim arising out of or related to this Agreement, shall be resolved exclusively through proceedings filed in the federal or state court in [SHEBOYGAN], [WI]. The invalidity or unenforceability of any provision or sentence of this Agreement shall not affect the validity or enforceability of any other provision or sentence of this Agreement, which shall remain in full force and effect.

I further understand and agree that any horse, irrespective of its training, its usual past behavior, and its characteristics, may act or react unpredictably at any time.

With full awareness of the foregoing, I am knowingly and voluntarily participating in equestrian activities at Wild Wind Farm and accept the possibility of injury to myself as a risk inherent in work on and around horses.

In consideration of my being permitted to enter the premises of Wild Wind Farm and to participate in equestrian activities, and for other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which I hereby acknowledge, I promise and agree as follows:

1. WARRANTIES AND REPRESENTATIONS:

- 1.1 I understand that horseback riding and training is a rigorous activity and is physically and mentally demanding. I hereby warrant and represent that I have the requisite level of physical fitness and mental awareness to enable me to participate in riding instruction. I further warrant and represent that I am in good physical health and free from injury, illness, disease or other defects which may impair my ability to engage in such activities.
- 1.2 I recognize the threat of exposure to tetanus that exists in the presence of livestock, and acknowledge my responsibility to obtain inoculation and maintain protection against tetanus, a disease endemic to horses.

2. RELEASE

I hereby release and forever discharge Jim and Tammy Risseeuw and its agents and all if the heirs, successors and assigns of the forgoing parties (collectively, the "releases"), from any and all liability for an and all losses, claims, demands, actions, causes of actions, damages, costs and expenses which I may hereinafter incur on account of any loss, damage, or injury (including death) to my person or properties, or the consequences thereof, which result from any accident, transaction, event, circumstance, occurrence, act or omission connected with or arising from equestrian activities, or while I am upon, entering or departing the premises of Wild Wind Farm, whether caused by the negligence of releasees or otherwise.

3. INTENT

The release contained in paragraph 2, above is intended to be broadly construed so as to release releases from all claims whatsoever arising out of any accident, transaction, event, circumstance, occurrence, act or omission including, without limiting the generality of the language in paragraph 2, above, the following:

- (A) Any loss, damage or injury (including death) incurred while I engage in equestrian activities, whether such loss, damage or injury arises as a result of the actions or omissions of the releases, a third party, a horse or other animal, an act of God, or combination thereof: or,
- (B) Any loss, damage or injury (including death) incurred while I upon, entering or departing the premises of Wild Wind Farm, whether such loss, damage or injury arises as a result of actions or omissions of releases, third party, a horse or other animal, an act of God, or combination thereof, or as a result of the negligent construction, maintenance or supervision of the buildings and/or grounds of Wild Wind Farm; or
- (C) Any loss, damage or injury (including death) incurred while I am upon, entering or departing from the premises of Wild Wind Farm, whether such loss, damage or injury arises as a result of a fire, storm, explosion or other casualty; or

(D) Any loss, damage or injury (including death) incurred while I am being medically treated for any illness or any injury which may occur while I am engaged in equestrian activities or while I am upon, entering or departing the premises of Wild Wind Farm.

4. INDEMNITY:

I hereby agree to indemnify and hold harmless releases, and each of them, from and against any and all claims, damages, costs, expenses or liabilities which they may incur as a result of any accident or injury caused by me while I am engaged in equestrian activities or while I am upon, entering or departing the premises of Wild Wind Farm.

5. MISCELLANEOUS:

- 5.1 This agreement shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of my heirs, successors, assigns and legal representatives.
- 5.2 This release shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Wisconsin. Notice: A person who is engaged for compensation in the rental of equines or equine equipment or tack or in the instruction of a person in the riding or driving of an equine or in being a passenger upon an equine is not liable for the injury or death of a person involved in equine activities resulting from the inherent risks of equine activities, as defined in section 895.481 (1) (e) of the Wisconsin Statutes."

I have read this release and fully understand all of its terms. I have executed this release voluntarily and with full knowledge of its significance.



DRESSAGE SCHOOLING CHAMPIONSHIP RULES

I. Dressage Awards

- Divisions are defined as Junior/Young Rider (Jr/YR) and Adult Amateur
 - A Junior/Young Rider (Jr/YR) is anyone that has not reached his/her 22nd birthday by January 1st of the award year.
 - Adult Amateurs must have an US Equestrian Federation (USEF) Amateur card or sign a WDCTA amateur affidavit. The card or affidavit must be included with the entry.
- Applicants may only compete in one Division per competition season.
- The following levels are eligible to participate in the Schooling Championship:
 - Introductory
 - Training Level
 - First Level
 - o Second Level
- Participants of the Schooling Championship are not eligible for other WDCTA annual awards, including:
 - Horse of the Year
 - o Rider of the Year
 - Championship program for recognized shows

II. Categories

- A champion and reserve champion will be named for each division at each level of competition -- Introductory through Second Level.
- Maiden awards are only open to those HORSES in their first year of showing at Introductory (Intro) Level through Second Level. Maiden awards will be given at each level for both divisions combined.

III. Registration and Eligibility

- The rider and owner of the horse must be members in good standing of WDCTA at the time scores are earned.
- A horse and rider combination may win an award or championship at any given level more than once.
- Championship registration for each horse and rider combination must be postmarked at least 1 day prior to the first show from which they plan to submit scores.
- A fee of \$25.00 for each level must be paid for each horse and rider combination to be eligible for championships.

- If competing for a Maiden award at any level, an additional fee of \$25 must be paid.
- Only one award is given for all divisions at that level for maiden even if there are two riders competing the horse.
- The Awards Chair must be notified in writing and fees paid if adding a level later in the year and prior to scores earned at that additional level.
- o All registrations are for the show year December 1 through November 30.

IV. Qualification for Dressage Championships

- The horse/rider combination must have three qualifying scores from three different judges from two different shows.
 - o Scores must be at least "L" candidates from a USEF Program.
 - Scores must be: minimum of 60% and above.
 - Scores must be from USEF, FEI or USDF tests.
 - The scores will be averaged.
 - Scores must be earned at shows open to all breeds.
 - One test score must be from the highest test for the level (e.g. Training Level Test 3).
 - Scores for the Maiden award may be from any test for the level.
 - If scores from a Regional Championship class are submitted, where more than one judge scored the ride, all scores must be averaged and will count as only one score.
 - Scores from Junior or Young Rider Team Tests will be accepted as long as the Team Test exactly matches the level test for which the Team Test is being submitted.
 - When a clinic is run in conjunction with a schooling show, using the show's
 judge as the clinician, the show must be held BEFORE the clinic in order for
 the rider's scores to qualify for year-end awards.

V. Submitting Scores

- The rider must send to the Awards Chair either the horse's USDF Score Sheet with their three chosen scores highlighted or a "GOOD QUALITY" photocopy of the original test for each qualifying score.
 - Photocopy must clearly state the show name, horse and rider, class, date, judge, score and judge's signature.
 - Photocopy does not have to include individual movement scores and comments.
- Scores must be postmarked on or before November 30. Scores may be submitted via email
 - o A reply will be sent indicating your results were received.
 - o Scores may also be sent through the U.S. Postal Service.
 - If you want notification that the awards chair received your scores when sent through the postal service, please include a self-addressed, stamped postcard with your score sheets.
- NOTE: No refunds after the awards application and payment are submitted.

Dressage Awards

- Divisions are defined as Junior/Young Rider (Jr/YR), Open and Adult Amateur
- Applicants may only compete in one Division per competition season.
- A Horse of The Year award will be awarded one for each of the following divisions Training First level;
 Second Fourth level; FEI levels.
- Levels are defined as In-Hand, Musical Freestyle, Materiale, Young Horse Tests, Rider Tests and Intro through Grand Prix.
 - A. A Junior/Young Rider (Jr/YR) is anyone that has not reached his/her 22nd birthday by January 1st of the award year.
 - B. Adult Amateurs must have an US Equestrian Federation (USEF) Amateur card or sign a WDCTA amateur affidavit. The card or affidavit must be included with the entry. If you enter as an Amateur but do not include the necessary proof of amateur status, you will be entered in the Open division.
 - C. A champion and reserve champion will be named for each division at each level of competition -- Introductory through FEI.
 - D. Maiden awards are only open to those HORSES in their first year of showing at Introductory (Intro) Level through Grand Prix. Only one award will be given at each level for all divisions combined.
 - E. One Champion and one Reserve Champion Musical Freestyle award will be given for First through FEI levels combined.

II. In-Hand Sport Horse Breed Awards

- A. A young horse is filly, colt or gelding 3 years of age or younger.
- B. A mature horse is a mare or stallion 4 years of age or older.
- C. Amateur Handler Award
- D. A Champion and Reserve Champion will be named for Young Horse Filly, Young Horse Colt/Gelding, Amateur Handler, Mature Horse Mare and Mature Horse Stallion.

III. Registration and Eligibility

- A. The rider and owner of the horse must be members in good standing of WDCTA at the time scores are earned.
- B. For in-hand classes, the handler does not need to be a WDCTA member, nor is it necessary to have the same handler for each class in order to qualify for year-end awards.
- C. A horse and rider combination <u>may</u> win an award or championship at any given level more than once. For In-hand Sport Horse Awards, Mature Horse (Mare/Stallion) may win more than once.
- D. Championship registration for each horse and rider combination must be postmarked at least 1 day prior to the first show from which they plan to submit scores.
- E. A fee of \$25.00 for each level must be paid for each horse and rider combination to be eligible for championships. If competing for a Maiden award at any level, an additional fee of \$25 must be paid. Only one award is given for all divisions at that level for maiden even if there are two riders competing the horse. There is no fee for the Horse of The Year award. (Note: if entering via PayPal, there is an additional cost.
- F. The Awards Chair must be notified in writing and fees paid if adding a level later in the year and prior to scores earned at that additional level.
- G. All registrations are for the show year December 1 through November 30.
- H. Registration is not necessary for the Horse of The Year award. Winning horses will be chosen from the eligible entries. To qualify for the Horse of The Year award, ALL SCORES MUST BE EARNED AT USDF/USEF-RECOGNIZED SHOWS.

IV. Qualification for Dressage Championships

- A. The horse/rider combination must have three qualifying scores from three different judges from two different shows. At least two of the qualifying scores submitted must come from USEF/USDF-recognized competitions. Only one may be from a schooling show. Remember, scores from "L" candidates and "r" judges are accepted through 2nd level. Scores from "R" judges are accepted through 4th level, and scores from "S" judges are accepted through Grand Prix.
- B. Scores must be: minimum of 60% at Intro through 4th level and minimum of 58% at PSG and above.
- C. Scores must be from USEF, FEI or USDF tests. The scores will be averaged.
- D. Scores must be earned at USEF/USDF-recognized shows, open to all breeds. At least one qualifying score submitted must be from a USEF/USDF-recognized show held in Wisconsin. One test score must be from the highest test for the level (e.g. Training Level Test 4).
- E. Scores for the Maiden award may be from any test for the level.
- F. If scores from a Regional Championship class are submitted, where more than one judge scored the ride, all scores must be averaged and will count as only one score.
- G. Scores from Junior or Young Rider Team Tests will be accepted as long as the Team Test exactly matches the level test for which the Team Test is being submitted.
- H. When a clinic is run in conjunction with a schooling show, using the show's judge as the clinician, the show must be held BEFORE the clinic in order for the rider's scores to qualify for year-end awards.
- I. The rider must send to the Awards Chair either the horse's USDF Score Sheet with their three chosen scores highlighted or a "GOOD QUALITY" photocopy of the original test for each qualifying score. Photocopy must clearly state the show name, horse and rider, class, date, judge, score and judges signature. Photocopy does not have to include individual movement scores and comments.
- J. Scores must be postmarked on or before November 30. Scores may be submitted via email; a reply will be sent indicating your results were received. Scores may also be sent through the U.S. Postal Service. If you want notification that the awards chair received your scores when sent through the postal service, please include a self-addressed, stamped postcard with your score sheets.
- K. For the Horse of the Year award, all of the above qualifications must be met, PLUS ALL SCORES MUST BE EARNED AT USDF/USEF-RECOGNIZED SHOWS.

V. Qualification For In Hand Sport Horse and Amateur Handler Championships

- A. The horse/handler must have two qualifying scores from two different judges, at two different shows. Both judges must have an USEF Sport Horse Judge license.
- B. Scores must be earned from USEF/USDF-recognized shows, open to all breeds. At least one qualifying score submitted must be from a USEF/USDF-recognized show held in Wisconsin.
- C. Scores may be from Sport Horse Prospect In-Hand classes and/or Breeding stock In-Hand classes. Scores will be averaged.
- D. The owner must send to the Awards Chair either the horse's USEF/USDF Score Sheet with their two chosen scores highlighted or a good quality photocopy of the original score sheet for each qualifying score. Photocopy must clearly state show name, horse and rider, class, date, judge, score and judge's signature. Photocopy does not have to include individual movement scores and comments.
- E. Postmark must be on or before November 30. Email will also be accepted.

EVENTING CHAMPIONSHIP RULES

I. Awards

- A. There shall be a Champion and Reserve Champion for Junior, Rider, and Open divisions at the following levels for **USEF-recognized shows**: Starter, Beginner Novice, Novice, Training, Preliminary/Training, Preliminary, Intermediate, Advanced.
- B. There shall be a Champion and Reserve Champion for Junior, Rider, and Open divisions at the following levels for WDCTA- and IDCTA-recognized **mini events**: Starter, Beginner Novice, Novice.
- C. The dressage scores from a combined test or three-phase event are eligible for the WDCTA 70% Club. WDCTA will award a certificate to the rider. Both owner and rider must be current WDCTA members. There is no fee for the 70% Club.

II. Registration and Eligibility

- A. Horse/Rider combinations must be registered with the Awards Chair, fees paid and postmarked at least 1 day before a competition for the scores to qualify for awards.
- B. There shall be a \$25 registration fee for each horse/rider combination per division for the award year for recognized events, and a \$20 registration fee for each horse/rider combination per mini event division. If applying via PayPal, additional fees will be applied.
- C. The rider of the horse must be a member in good standing of WDCTA and USEA at the time the scores are earned. (Beginner Novice, Mini-Event, and 70% Club participants may be exempt from USEA membership, but both rider and owner must still be members of WDCTA at the time the scores are earned.) The riders should submit proof of their membership to WDCTA and USEA. The owners should submit proof of their membership in WDCTA.
- D. The Awards Chair must be notified in writing and fees paid if adding a level or division later in the year.and prior to scores earned at that additional level.
- E. The award year is December 1 through November 30.

III. Qualifications

A. Only scores from USEA Events can be used to meet championship qualification (Mini-Event are exempt from this rule.) Send good quality copies of a USEA Score Print-Out/Rider Profile along with the eventing awards report form. Or send in a good quality copy of dressage test and the final standings (photograph of posted show standings is fine). For mini events, send in a quality copy of the dressage test and a photograph of posted show standings, or online link if that is applicable.
